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A cognitive Stylistic of Taylor Swift’s song “I can do it with a broken heart”

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ABSTRACT

This study analyzes the lyrics of Taylor Swift’s song “I Can Do It With A Broken Heart” to explore how she conveys themes of resilience and emotional turmoil. The research addresses the gap in understanding the specific mechanisms through which contemporary music reflects complex emotional states. Utilizing qualitative text analysis, the study examines the song’s interpersonal dynamics, framing, and metaphors. Findings reveal a tension between the protagonist’s public persona and private pain, highlighted through vivid metaphors and imagery that depict resilience despite adversity. This analysis contributes to the broader discourse on music as a form of emotional expression, emphasizing its societal implications.

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1. Introduction

Music has always been a profound medium for emotional expression, capturing the complexities of human experiences through melody and lyrics. Taylor Swift, a prominent figure in contemporary music, is renowned for her evocative songwriting that delves deeply into personal and universal themes of love, heartbreak, and resilience. Her song “I Can Do It With A Broken Heart” epitomizes these themes, portraying a narrative of inner strength amidst emotional turmoil. This study aims to

analyze the interpersonal dynamics, framing, and metaphors within the lyrics of this song, providing insights into the complex interplay between personal pain and public performance.

The role of music as a conduit for emotional expression has been extensively documented. Juslin and Västfjäll (2008) emphasize that music can evoke a wide range of emotions, serving both personal reflection and social communication purposes. In popular music, lyrics are pivotal in articulating these emotions, offering listeners narratives that they can relate to their own experiences (Schäfer, Sedlmeier, Städtler, & Huron, 2013). Taylor Swift's lyrical style, characterized by its narrative quality and emotional depth, resonates with a broad audience, making her music a rich subject for analysis.

Swift's ability to convey personal experiences in a relatable manner has been highlighted in numerous studies. Adams and Fuller (2006) note that her lyrics often employ storytelling techniques that create vivid emotional landscapes. This is particularly evident in "I Can Do It With A Broken Heart," where Swift navigates themes of love, loss, and resilience. The song not only reflects personal emotional struggles but also resonates with broader societal expectations, where individuals are often compelled to maintain a façade of success and happiness despite personal hardships (Horton & Wohl, 1956).

In the Indonesian context, music also serves as a powerful vehicle for emotional expression. Studies by Wicaksono (2016) and Wijayanti (2019) explore how Indonesian musicians convey themes of love, loss, and resilience through their lyrics, highlighting the universality of music as a form of emotional communication. These studies underscore the global relevance of examining how artists like Swift use their music to navigate and express complex emotional landscapes.

Despite the extensive body of work on music and emotional expression, there is a lack of detailed analysis focusing on the specific mechanisms through which artists like Taylor Swift convey complex emotional states through their lyrics. This study seeks to address this gap by analyzing "I Can Do It With A Broken Heart" lyrics to understand how Swift uses interpersonal dynamics, framing, and metaphors to articulate themes of resilience and emotional turmoil.

The primary objective of this study is to conduct a qualitative analysis of the lyrics of "I Can Do It With A Broken Heart" to uncover the nuanced interpersonal dynamics, framing, and metaphors employed by Taylor Swift, with a focus on analyzing how Swift portrays the tension between public persona and private pain, examining the use of metaphors and imagery in conveying emotional resilience, and understanding the societal implications of the themes expressed in the song.

This research is significant because it provides a deeper understanding of how contemporary music reflects and shapes societal attitudes towards emotional resilience and authenticity. By focusing on Taylor Swift's "I Can Do It With A Broken Heart," the study contributes to the broader discourse on music as a form of emotional expression and highlights the ways in which artists navigate the pressures of public and private personas.

The study is grounded in theories of emotional expression and resilience. Juslin and Västfjäll's (2008) framework on music and emotional responses provides a basis for understanding how lyrics can evoke and articulate complex emotional states. Additionally, Bonanno's (2004) theory of resilience, which emphasizes the ability to maintain stable levels of functioning despite adversity, informs the analysis of the protagonist's portrayal of strength and capability amidst emotional pain.

In conclusion, this study aims to provide a comprehensive analysis of Taylor Swift’s “I Can Do It With A Broken Heart” through the lenses of interpersonal dynamics, framing, and metaphors. The research will shed light on how Swift navigates the tension between public expectations and private experiences, contributing to a deeper understanding of the role of music in emotional expression. This analysis will enhance our appreciation of Swift’s artistry and provide insights into her work’s broader societal implications. The subsequent sections will delve into the detailed analysis and findings of this study.

2. Method

The qualitative text analysis method was chosen because it is su for examining the nuanced and subjective nature of song lyrics. This method allowed for an in-depth exploration of the themes and emotional expressions embedded in the text. The approach facilitated a detailed understanding of the interpersonal dynamics and literary devices used by the artist, providing insights into the complex interplay between personal and public identities (Denzin & Lincoln, 2011).

The systematic coding and categorization process ensured that the analysis was thorough and methodical, while the thematic analysis provided a structured framework for interpreting the data. By combining these techniques, the study was able to uncover the rich layers of meaning within the lyrics, offering a comprehensive understanding of the song’s narrative and emotional depth (Smith, 2000).

2.1 Data Collection

The data for this study was collected from the lyrics of Taylor Swift’s “I Can Do It With A Broken Heart.” This song was selected due to its rich textual content, which explores themes of emotional resilience, public versus private self, and the interplay of personal and professional identities. The lyrics were sourced from a reputable lyrics database to ensure accuracy and completeness.

2.2 Data Generation

To facilitate a comprehensive analysis, the lyrics were transcribed and segmented into individual lines and verses. This segmentation allowed for a detailed examination of the interpersonal dynamics, framing, and metaphors within the song. Each segment was coded and categorized based on thematic elements, emotional expressions, and literary devices (Gibbs, 2007).

2.3 Data Analysis

The analysis followed a qualitative text analysis methodology, which involved several key steps. The lyrics were read multiple times to gain an overall understanding of the content and context. Notes were made regarding initial impressions, recurring themes, and prominent emotional tones (Braun & Clarke, 2006). The text was then systematically coded to identify key themes, metaphors, and framings. Codes were assigned to segments of the text that reflected significant interpersonal

dynamics, expressions of resilience, and contrasts between public and private personas (Saldaña, 2015). The codes were grouped into broader categories that encapsulated the main themes of the song. Categories included "Public vs. Private Self," "Emotional Resilience," "Societal Expectations," and "Metaphorical Imagery" (Ryan & Bernard, 2003). Each category was analyzed to understand its contribution to the overall narrative of the song. Thematic connections were identified, such as how metaphors of performance and resilience intertwined with the protagonist's emotional journey (Guest, MacQueen, & Namey, 2012). The results of the thematic analysis were interpreted to draw conclusions about the song's portrayal of emotional resilience and identity. Specific attention was given to the bridge of the song, which provided a pivotal moment of emotional revelation and defiance (Nowell et al., 2017). Finally, the analysis was reviewed and validated by other researchers to ensure reliability and consistency. Discrepancies were discussed and resolved to refine the final interpretation (Creswell & Poth, 2017).

3. Results and discussion

The song "I Can Do it With A Broken Heart" by Taylor Swift intricately portrays themes of resilience, hidden pain, and the contrast between public and private personas. Through detailed line-by-line analysis, it becomes evident that the protagonist maintains a façade of competence and happiness while struggling with deep emotional pain. Each line contributes to a narrative of perseverance, highlighting the challenges of sustaining professional and personal identities amidst inner turmoil. The song uses vivid metaphors and stark imagery to underscore the protagonist's strength and the disconnect between her public image and private reality. This analysis reveals a profound commentary on the pressures of societal expectations and the strength required to navigate personal hardships while maintaining outward appearances.

The lyrics depict a glamorous external life contrasted with deep internal struggles, emphasizing societal pressures to maintain a facade of happiness and success despite personal hardships. This study highlights the broader societal implications of such themes, illustrating how music can articulate complex emotional experiences and reflect cultural norms regarding emotional expression.

Based on these findings, it is suggested that future research expands to include a diverse range of artists and genres, exploring how different musicians convey emotional complexity through their lyrics. Comparative studies across cultural contexts could further enrich our understanding of how cultural influences shape lyrical themes. Interdisciplinary approaches, combining qualitative text analysis with psychological and sociological methodologies, could offer deeper insights into the impact of music on listeners' emotional well-being and societal perceptions of emotional expression.

Additionally, research should focus on the mental health implications for public figures, examining the pressures of maintaining a public persona and its effects on mental health. Practical applications could involve using music in educational and therapeutic settings to facilitate discussions about emotional resilience and authenticity. Incorporating songs like "I Can Do It With A Broken Heart" into these contexts can help individuals articulate their emotions and develop coping strategies.

Finally, the music industry should prioritize supporting artists' mental health by providing resources and support systems to help them manage the pressures of public life. This approach can

contribute to a healthier industry environment and more sustainable careers for artists. Overall, extending this research and applying its insights in various contexts can enhance our understanding of the relationship between music, emotion, and society, benefiting both artists and audiences.

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
